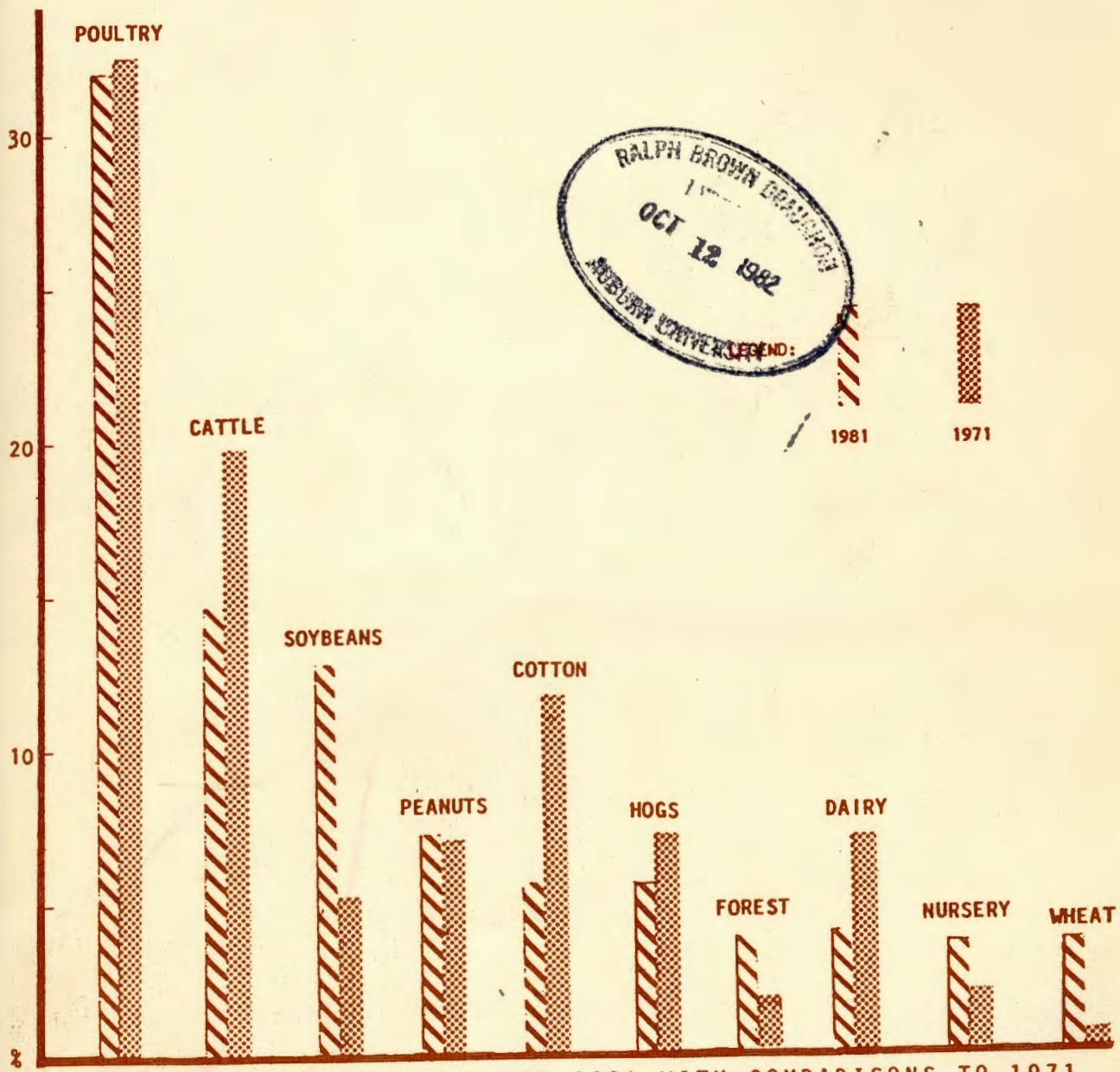

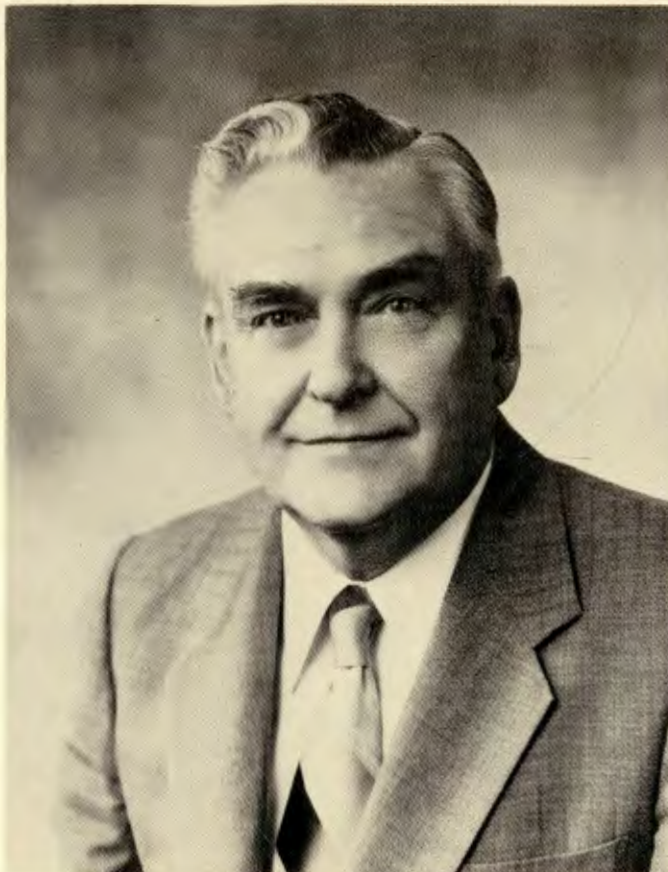

FOREWORD


This annual bulletin is twenty-fourth in a series dating back to 1948. This publication remains the most popular of our releases, based on subscriber requests. We have attempted to make these bulletins the most complete accumulation of current statistical data available relating to agriculture in Alabama. This issue contains the preliminary data series of state and county estimates for 1981 and comparable data for earlier years.

The estimates in this bulletin are developed primarily from sample surveys. In recent years we have come to rely heavily on a program of probability sampling, enumerative surveys, and objective yield measurements to support our old standby, the mail survey system. This was done to increase the precision of our estimates. Recent budget constraints have altered the frequency of some estimates and a few have been eliminated. By doing this, we continue to strive to maintain quality of the remaining data series.

I want to say a special thanks to the many Alabama farmers and agribusinessmen who assist us by providing basic data about this state's agriculture. The accuracy of our estimates is closely linked to the degree of response to our surveys. We sincerely appreciate your continued cooperation. You may be assured we have kept our pledge of confidentiality of reported data.

Individual reports from farmers have been supplemented by those from the Alabama Cooperative Extension Service. We rely heavily on their contributions for weekly crop weather and county level cash farm income estimates.

I also express my sincere appreciation to the staff of the Alabama Crop and Livestock Reporting Service for their continued efforts in data collection and analysis to provide quality statistics for the state of Alabama.

CROPS REVIEW

1981

Record-high wheat production and yields highlighted the 1981 season, along with record peanut production. Cotton yields were the second highest in history, exceeded only by 1971. Soybean yields were close to the historic average, while peanut yields were the third highest in history, behind the 1979 and 1977 poundages. Oats production was nearly double the 1980 level because of the record-high yield. Corn production was up markedly, and sorghum production was up slightly from last year, primarily because of increased acres for harvest.

During February, low temperatures and wet soils limited field activities to a minimum. March brought warm weather to the state, allowing farmers to advance corn planting to a level well above the previous year. Open weather during April brought soil moisture supplies to mostly short, but allowed rapid advancement of cotton, peanuts, and sorghum planting. Soybean planting was under way by May 3. In mid-May, dry conditions brought planting to a standstill. Emerged crops began to show effects of lack of moisture and were rated in fair condition.

Much-needed rain during the last half of May brought moisture supplies to nearly adequate. Wheat harvest was under way in late May, while planting of cotton, corn, and peanuts was virtually complete. Rain throughout the first part of June kept soil moisture supplies adequate, but farming activities continued with little interruption. Wheat harvest advanced ahead of schedule. All crops were rated in good condition, except cotton, which was fair.

By mid-June, rain kept soil moisture adequate, however, the wheat harvest and soybean planting made fair advances. Ideal harvest conditions were evident throughout the state during the week ending June 21. At the end of June, wheat harvest was virtually complete. Soybean planting was slightly ahead of normal and virtually complete by July 12. Rain was needed across the state toward the end of June, but all crops were in mostly good condition.

Hot summer weather arrived in mid-July and settled in, extracting soil moisture supplies and causing short to very short conditions. Crop development continued to advance ahead of last year and the average, despite a need for rain. Fair conditions existed on all crops. During the last week of July, corn harvest was just beginning. Scattered rain during the week ending August 10 brought some relief, but not enough to rate soil moisture above short. Toward the end of August, the first time since June, soil moisture supplies were rated adequate over most of the state. The rain aided crop development and most crops were in good condition, except corn, which was rated fair by September 6. Peanut harvest had begun by mid-September, with cotton picking and sorghum harvest barely beginning. Cool, dry weather at the end of September provided ideal harvest conditions. Soybean harvest began around September 27.

October weather continued to be dry, excellent for harvest progress, but the lack of rain was hurting many late-season crops and winter forage. Cotton, peanut, and soybean harvest was ahead of normal by October 11. Wheat seeding was advancing, but dry conditions caused some acreage to be replanted. Corn harvest was virtually complete by October 18. Relief was in store by November 1, when enough moisture had accumulated to bring soil conditions to adequate, the first time since mid-September. Peanut harvest wrapped up in early November. Harvest of cotton and soybeans progressed slightly ahead of schedule and neared completion by December 6.

Alabama farmers harvested their crops from 4.67 million acres in 1981, up 14 percent from 1980.

LIVESTOCK REVIEW

1981

Cash Receipts Increase 12 Percent: Alabama livestock producers received \$450.1 million from marketings of cattle, calves, hogs, and pigs during 1981. This was 12 percent above the 1980 total of \$400.9 million, but 19 percent below the 1979 record of \$554.8 million. Cash receipts from cattle and calves, at \$323.5 million, was 17 percent above 1980, while hogs and pigs cash receipts, at \$126.6 million, was 2 percent above 1980. The average price per hundredweight for cattle in 1981 was \$47.80, compared with \$55.30 in 1980. Calf prices per hundredweight declined from \$69.10 in 1980 to \$58.30 in 1981. The average price per hundredweight for hogs in 1981, at \$43.00, compares with \$37.00 a year earlier.

Cattle Numbers Increase 1 Percent: All cattle and calves on hand in Alabama on January 1, 1982, numbered 1,950,000 head. This was 1 percent above the January 1, 1981, inventory. Total cows that have calved remained unchanged from 1980, at 1,010,000 head. Beef cows increased 1,000 head from January 1, 1980, to 947,000, while milk cows declined 2 percent to total 63,000 head. All heifers 500 pounds and over were up 5 percent. Steers 500 pounds and over increased 18 percent, while calves less than 500 pounds increased slightly from the January 1, 1980, inventory level. The Alabama calf crop totaled 870,000 head, down 1 percent from a year ago. Alabama ranked 20th among states in total cattle and calves, and 16th in the number of beef cows that have calved.

Record Low Hog Inventory: Alabama pork producers' December 1, 1981, hog inventory at 540,000 head was the lowest level on record (beginning in 1867). The December 1, 1981, inventory was down 260,000 head (32 percent) from a year earlier. Breeding stock, at 85,000 head, was down 32 percent from December 1, 1980, while market hogs, at 455,000 head, declined 33 percent. Alabama ranked 20th among states in total hog numbers.

Milk Production Down 5 Percent: During 1981, 582 million pounds of milk were produced on Alabama farms, a decline of 5 percent from the 610 million pounds in 1980. The average number of milk cows on farms was 63,000 head, 5,000 below the 1980 average. Production per cow increased from 8,971 pounds in 1980 to 9,238 in 1981.

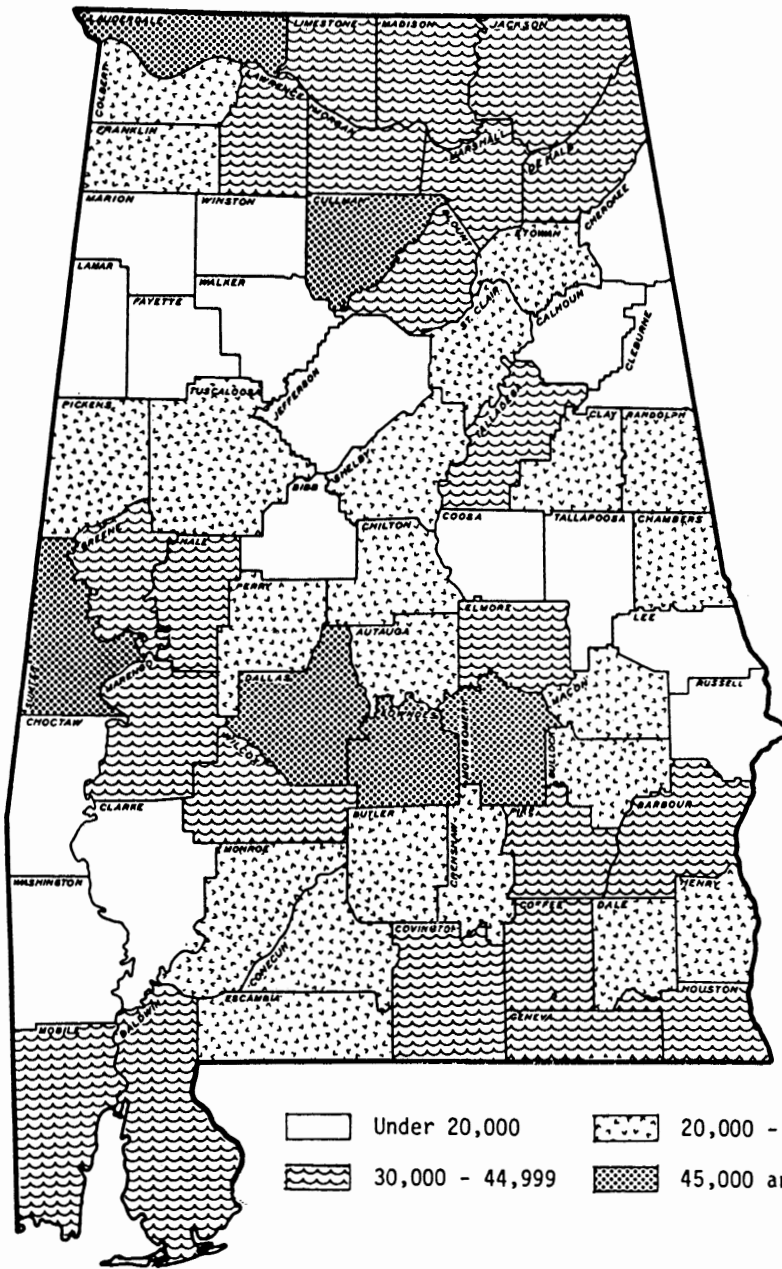
Red Meat Production Up 6 Percent: Production of red meat (beef, veal, pork, and mutton) in Alabama totaled 273.7 million pounds during 1981. This was 6 percent above the 258.9 million pound total in 1980. Cattle slaughtered in 1981 totaled 225,000 head, up 10 percent from 1980. The number of calves slaughtered, at 5,300 head, was 15 percent above the 1980 total. Hogs butchered in 1981 totaled 761,000 head, 2 percent below the 1980 level.

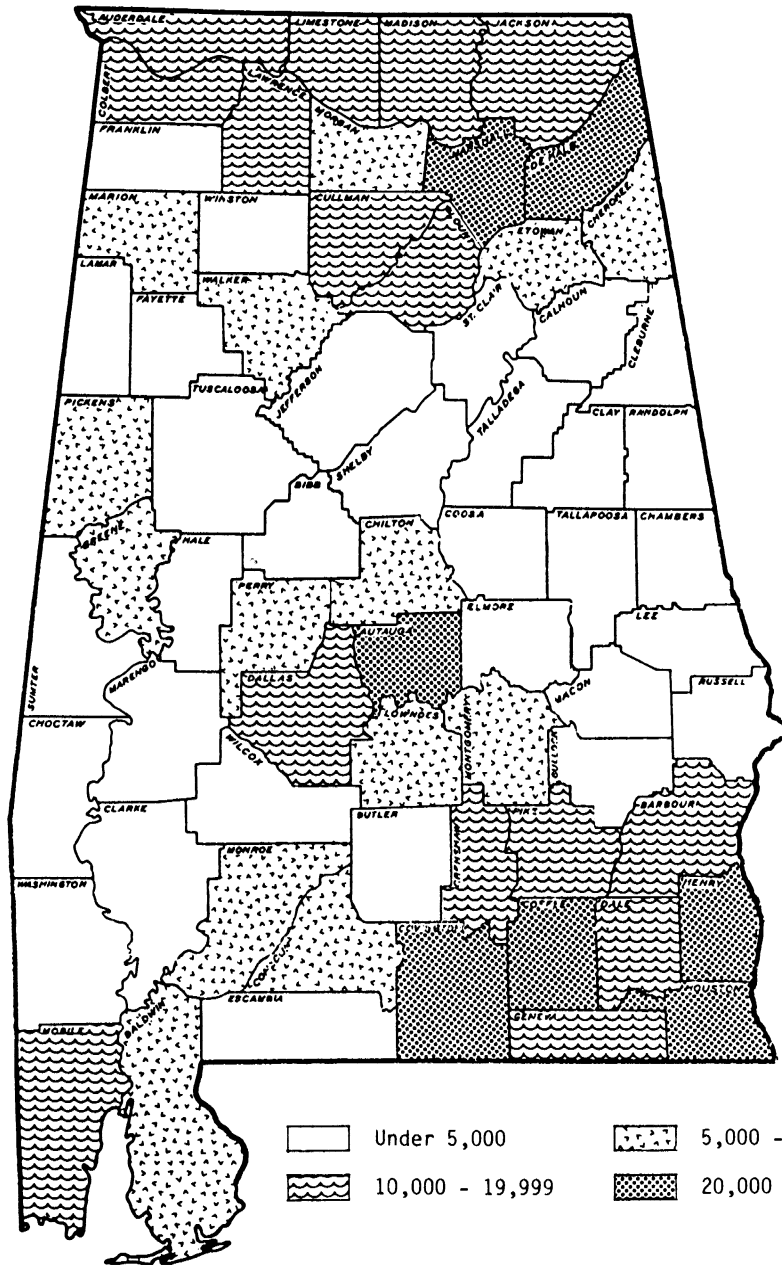

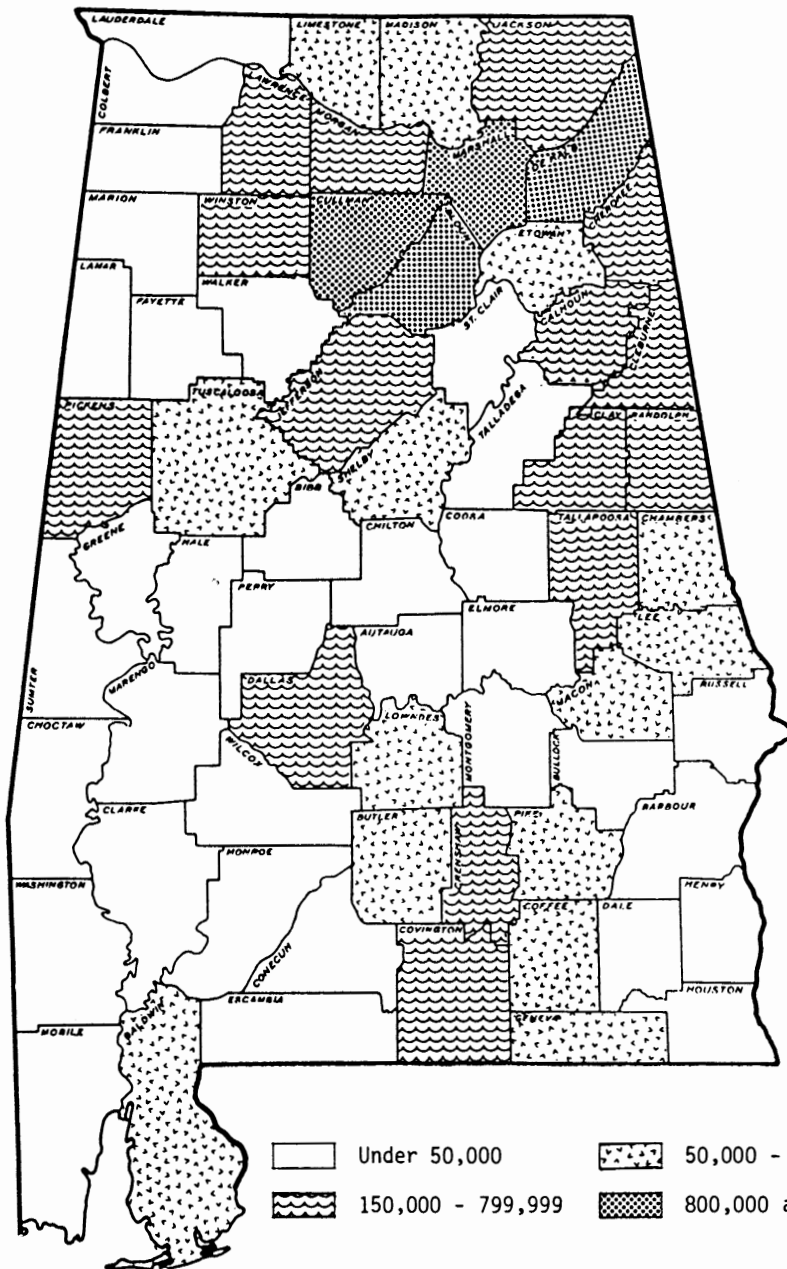
Poultry Continues to Lead Alabama's Agricultural Sector: Cash receipts from farm marketings of commercial poultry and poultry products (broilers, chickens, and eggs) in 1981 continued to maintain the largest share of the state's income from agriculture. Sales of commercial broilers, chickens, and eggs, at \$718 million, claimed 32 percent of the total 1981 Alabama agricultural cash receipts. This was an increase of 6 percent from the 1980 total of \$676 million. Broiler production cash receipts comprised 73 percent of the total, while egg production accounted for 26 percent. Cash receipts from chickens had only minor significance. In 1981, Alabama ranked third nationally in the value of sales of broilers, chickens, and eggs behind Arkansas and Georgia.

Broiler Industry Sets Production Record Again: Alabama broiler producers marketed a record 519.3 million birds in the 1981 marketing year, an increase of 2.5 million from the 1980 production. Broiler production records have been established for each succeeding year since 1978. Gross income from broilers, at \$522.9 million, was up 7 percent from the 1980 marketing year total of \$488.8 million. The price per pound received by growers (liveweight at farm) increased from 26.0 cents in 1980 to 26.5 cents in 1981. Alabama is the third largest broiler-producing state in the country.

Egg Production Down 8 Percent: During 1981, Alabama's laying flocks produced 3,095 million eggs, down 259 million (8 percent) from the record production of 3,354 million eggs produced in 1980. Egg production from all hatching flocks accounted for 26 percent of the total egg production in 1981. The balance was comprised from commercial layer flocks and farm flocks of less than 400 layers. The average number of hens and pullets of laying age on hand in 1981 was 12.9 million, compared with 13.7 million in 1980. Twenty-eight percent, or 3.6 million, of these chickens were in hatching flocks. The average number of eggs laid per hen was 241 during 1981, compared with 244 a year earlier. Egg production accounted for \$187.7 million in poultry cash receipts. Alabama ranked sixth nationally in production of eggs.

Hatchery Production Up 3 Percent: Commercial hatcheries in Alabama hatched 620.4 million chicks in 1981. This record number surpasses last year's previous high of 600.8 million chicks by 3 percent. Broiler-type chicks hatched totaled 611,470,000 and accounted for 99 percent of the total hatch. Egg-type hatch was 8,914,000 chicks.

Chicken Production (excluding broilers) Decreases 1 Percent: During 1981, Alabama poultrymen produced 13.2 million chicks (excluding broilers), down 1 percent from the 1980 total of 13.3 million. This phase largely reflects the production of replacement pullets for laying flocks and production in small farm flocks. Cash receipts from the sale of chickens were \$7.5 million compared with \$7.3 million in 1980.

PRICES REVIEW

Prices Received by Farmers: The All Commodity Index of Prices Received by Alabama Farmers averaged 552 percent of the 1910-14=100 base in 1981, compared with 565 in 1980. This was a decrease of 2 percent from 1980 and 1 percent below 1979. Contributing most to the decrease were lower crop prices for soybeans and cotton and lower livestock prices for cattle and calves.

The Crops Index, one of the components of the All Commodity Index, was 616 percent of the base in 1981, down less than 1 percent from the 1980 average. Soybeans averaged \$6.10 per bushel, down \$1.53 from the 1980 price of \$7.63. Cotton averaged 57.0 cents per pound, 22.2 cents less than the previous year's average of 79.2 cents per pound. The price of corn averaged \$2.75 per bushel, down 85 cents from a year ago. Wheat, at \$3.35 per bushel, decreased 50 cents from a year earlier. Potatoes, at \$11.00 per cwt., rose \$3.40 from the previous year. The price of peanuts, at 25.9 cents per pound, increased 2.1 cents from the 1980 average.

The Livestock and Products Index, the other part of the All Commodity Index, was 520 percent of the base in 1980, down 4 percent from the 1980 average. Beef cattle averaged \$47.80 per cwt., down \$7.50 from the 1980 price of \$55.30. The average price of calves was \$58.30 per cwt., \$10.80 below a year ago. Hogs, at \$43.00 per cwt., were up \$6.00 from 1980. Eggs, at 73.1 cents per dozen, were 8.4 cents above the previous year. Broiler prices, at 26.5 cents per pound, were 0.5 cent above a year earlier. Milk sold wholesale by farmers averaged \$14.70 per cwt. in 1981, up 30 cents from year ago.

Prices Paid by Farmers: Alabama does not have an Index of Prices Paid by Farmers. Therefore, direct comparison between prices paid and those received by Alabama farmers cannot be made. However, the cost of production items increased from the previous year.

Farmers in the state paid an average of \$227.00 per ton for chick starter in 1981, compared with \$213.00 in 1980 and \$192.00 in 1979. Broiler grower sold for \$232.00 per ton in 1981, compared with \$201.00 in 1980 and \$187.00 in 1979.

Laying feed sold for \$217.00 per ton in 1981, compared with \$193.00 in 1980 and \$172.00 in 1979. Soybean meal, 44 percent protein, at \$15.00 per cwt., increased \$1.50 from the \$13.50 paid in 1980. Hog feed, 14-18 percent protein, sold for \$11.50 per cwt. during 1981, up \$1.00 from the \$10.50 in 1980.

FARM INCOME REVIEW

1981

Cash Farm Income: Total cash farm income from farm marketings for 1981 increased 17 percent from \$2,117,951,000 in 1980 to \$2,476,839,000. Most major commodities showed increases, with the exception of milk, which dropped 2 percent.

Alabama poultry and poultry products accounted for 28.7 percent of the state's total receipts from farm marketings. Cattle and calves were second, with 13.1 percent, and soybeans placed third, with 11.5 percent. Other major commodities were cotton, 5.2 percent; hogs, 5.1 percent; farm forest products, 3.5 percent; milk, 3.4 percent; and wheat, 3.1 percent. Sales from these eight items accounted for 73.5 percent of all cash receipts from farm marketings in Alabama in 1981.

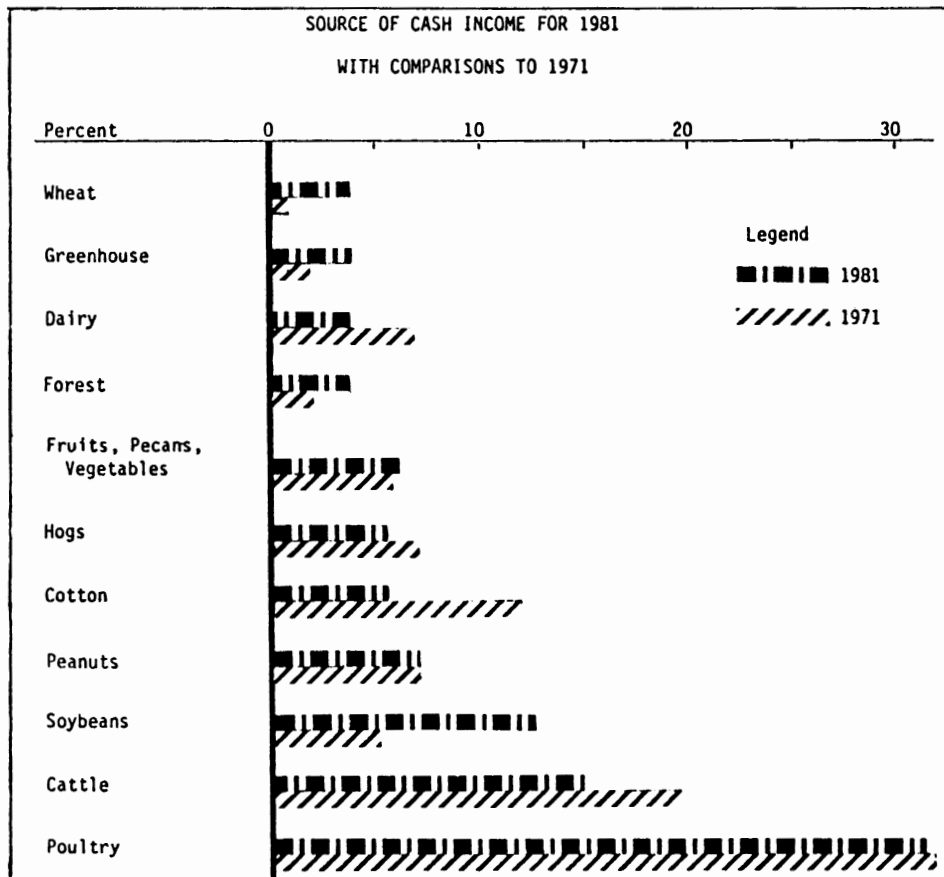
Farm Income Concepts: Cash receipts from farm marketings represents gross income from the sales of crops, livestock, and poultry during the calendar year. The value of home consumption of farm products, inter-farm sales of livestock, and crops fed on farms where grown are not included as cash receipts. Production expenses such as feed, fuel, fertilizer, and marketing costs are not dealt with when referring to gross cash receipts. County estimates of cash receipts reflect farm productivity of the county to which the production is assigned. For example, income from crops is credited to the producing county even though the crops may be stored, processed, and marketed in another county.

Cash receipts from marketings of crops is the final product of several estimates: acreage, yield, percentage of total production sold, average price, and changes in inventories. However, cash receipts should not be compared to value of production for such crops as corn, hay, cotton, and soybeans because portions of these crops are sold the next calendar year. Calendar year cash receipts from such crops represents sales of parts of production from two or more crop years. For crops such as peanuts, cash receipts is essentially the same as the value of production since the crop is all or nearly all harvested and marketed within a single calendar year.

The annual cash receipts from farm marketings of livestock and poultry also refers to the calendar year. Receipts include the sales value of an animal only once, usually the calf at the time it is sold for slaughter or final disposition. These receipts do not represent the summation of all income received from livestock and poultry producers in a given county. For example, feeder pigs or cattle sold from one farm to another within a county are included only upon final disposition. Also, when commodities such as broilers are produced under contract, the grower may directly receive only a contract payment. However, these data include the full value at the farm level of the broilers sold.

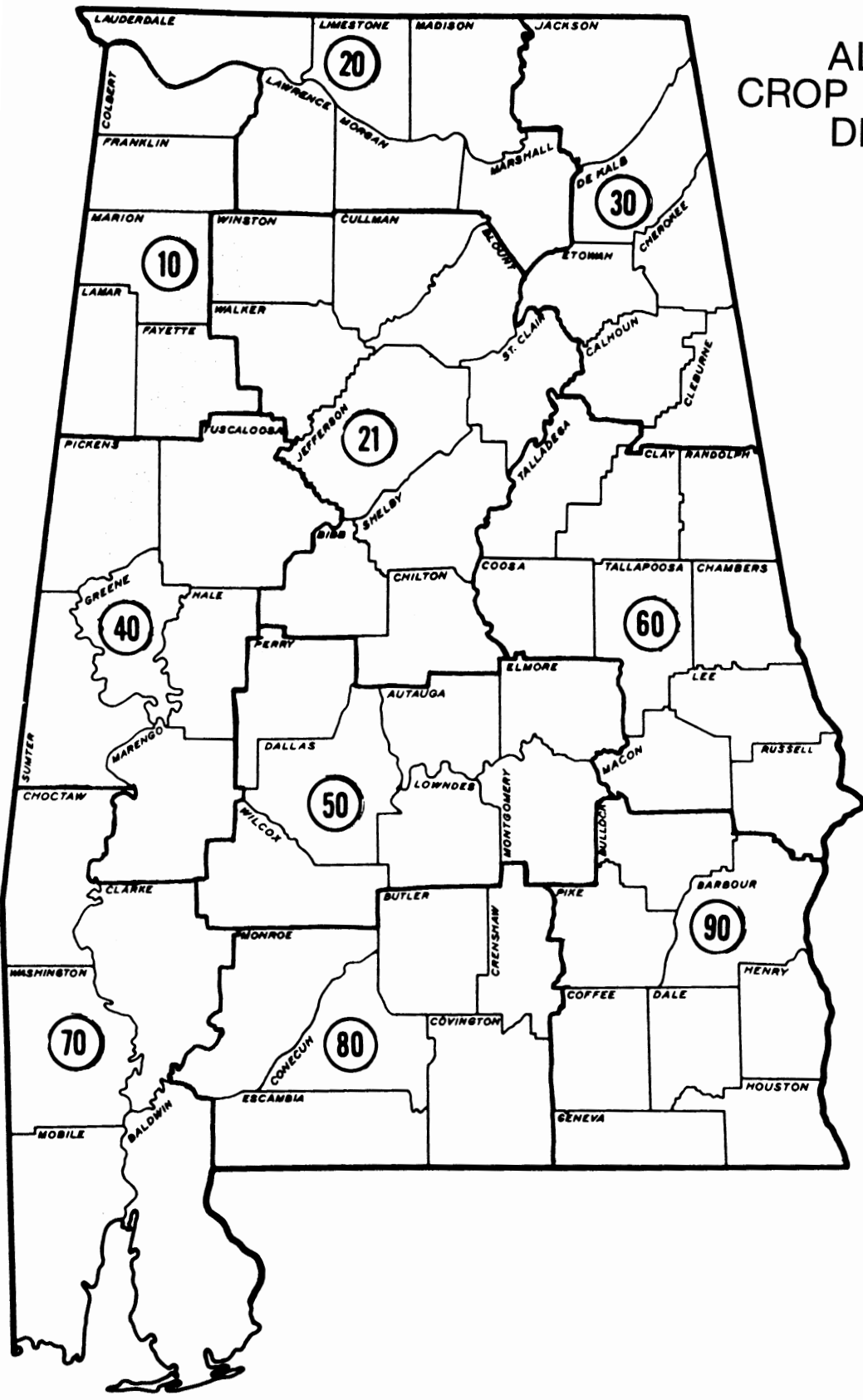
